
Demographic Data:

- 22 respondents (or 71%) of survey respondents were 2022 graduates


Trends:

- Survey results indicate a high level of satisfaction with the program
 - 96.8% of students agree or strongly agree the program improved the quality of their experience at CU Boulder.
 - \circ 87.1% of students ranked the program a 9 or 10 out 10 in overall level of satisfaction.
 - 96.8% of students agree or strongly agree they would recommend the program to other CU students.
 - \circ 96.8% of students would have enrolled in the certificate program if it was offered as a minor.
 - 67.7% of students would have enrolled in the certificate program if it was offered as a major.






I believe the PACS Certificate Program gave me skills I would not otherwise have gotten as part of my studies at CU Boulder.






I believe the PACS Certificate Program exposed me to knowledge and course materials I would not otherwise have gotten as part of my studies at CU Boulder.






I believe the PACS Certificate Program improved the quality of my experience at CU Boulder. 31 responses




I have been able to put the knowledge and skills gained from the PACS Certificate Program to use in my daily life.







On a scale from 1 to 10, please rate your overall level of satisfaction with the PACS Certificate Program.




Would you have enrolled in the PACS Program if it was offered as a minor at CU Boulder? 31 responses

Q - In what way could the PACS Program be improved?

- I think the PACS program could be improved with much more funding and room for more classes. This program is incredible, but needs expansion and more funds being a-located so were able to bring in more students and opportunity. I know it is not a minor or major but this is a program with such potential, and it is imperative that it start getting recognized more for everything it teaches us.
- I think it would be great too if there was a network for students who know that they
 want to see the certificate all the way through. I had many courses with students who

 like I knew the majority of the students. I think it would be beneficial to know other
 people who have the same goal in the program.

- More funding. The importance of this program is vital, has a STEM major its important to understand the dimensions of PACS. Funding would allow for an experience and expertise of a program that matters in our modern paradigm to prepare the next generation to make a tangible, sustainable, and meaningful impact on the world and in their careers.

Also making the courses a little less repetitive could be beneficial to keep students engaged.
